# **Devolution Deals**

An initial review

### 1 Introduction

- To date, devolution deals have been agreed with six city-regions: Greater Manchester, Sheffield City Region, Tees Valley, the North East, Liverpool City Region and the West Midlands. The enabling legislation, the Cities and Devolution Bill, received royal assent in January 2016, paving the way for the first mayoral elections to take place in May 2017.
- 1.2 A central part of the government's mandate, further devolution deals are expected over the course of 2016. The information below compares the key powers and responsibilities devolved to combined authorities so far. It consists of extracts from the published deal documents, rather than our own analysis.
- 1.3 There have also been further changes to local government powers, such as the devolution of business rates, additional to those discussed below. Since many of these deals were made, changes in government policy mean that some competencies and government programmes that have been devolved have since been abolished.
- 1.4 Whilst a devolution deal with the county of Cornwall has been agreed, this documents shall only focus on devolution deals with combined authorities centred around city-regions.
